

But I didn't want to listen to them. And I didn't. I sat for my O Levels in bilingual classes, got 9 A's. Then came the big exam, A Levels - sat for A Levels via Maths stream, got 3 A's and was selected to the Engineering faculty of the University of Moratuwa. You might know, typically a Sri Lankan student will have to wait at least a year until they get their university entrance. An entire year without doing anything; what a waste of time. But I didn't want to be like that, had something in mind. From my early childhood days, I was so passionate about foreign languages and literature. I was a big fan of you know who.... William Shakespeare. I remember, even without understanding a single word or a single line, I used to love reciting the lines of Hamlet. "To BE or not to BE? That is the question." So I had this crazy idea of sitting for A Levels once again via Arts stream, doing languages and literature. You might be thinking, what?? This guy did A Levels in Maths and now he wants to do in Arts again, I mean what?

Believe me, even my friends had the same problem. "Machan are you crazy? You have been selected to the Engineering faculty of University of Moratuwa. For god's sake this is the 21st century, literature? Come on, do something like CIMA!". Did I listen to it? No. I pursued my passion. Today I'm happy to say that I'm an Engineering undergraduate who is able to speak four languages other than my mother tongue. But I'm still that Village Drunkard's boy, I'm still that Shepherd Lady's son. But, there was more to it, I was brave or foolish enough to break those limits set by other people or by myself sometimes.

It's the little things; a smile, a kind word, a small gesture of appreciation from every single member of this huge family that coalesces into a huge lake of hope that makes me confident enough to talk in front of people that I truly care about. I dedicate this stage to all of them.



Face-to-Face An Interview with Dulmi Fonseka Vice President Education (2021/22)

1. How did your Gavel journey begin?

Well, my Gavel journey began all the way back in 2019 when I came to the first ever Gavel meeting held that year. It was a room packed with people and I still remember how Senali akki with a big smile on her face gave me a warm welcome, how Kithmin aiya told us that he'll give us gifts from Japan if we did a table topic and how Kasun aiya was the only one who laughed at my round robin even though it was not that funny. They made me feel as if I belonged there which kept me coming back to gavel again and again.

2. How has Gavel helped you reach where you are today?

I wouldn't be here if it was not for Gavel Mora. If not for the continuous support of my Gavel family who were always there for me through thick and thin, surviving university would have been impossible. Be it competitions, mentoring, organizing meetings, working on projects, giving life advice or simply listening to my complaints, they were always there just a phone call away. They would always make sure that I was okay.

3. What does public speaking mean to you?

Public speaking is one of my passions. Speaking on stage, sharing your stories, hearing the applause of the audience, the rush of emotions, and the thrill, it all makes public speaking an experience worth reliving again and again. That's why I do public speaking. That's why I love public speaking.



4. Are there any speakers you admire? Who are they and why do you admire them?

The speaker I admire the most is Dananjaya Hettiarachchi. I still remember the first time I listened to his winning speech 'I See Something'. I almost didn't believe he's from Sri Lanka and the moment he pulled out a full rose in the end I remember thinking to myself, "Wow, he is a magician". And ever since then I too wanted to create magic on stage with my stories.

5. Where do you find inspiration for your speeches?

My too old and boring yet interesting life with ups and downs. I always try to speak about my life experiences and what I learned from them.

6. What matters more - content or delivery?

I'd say both. It's like the two sides of a coin, you just can't do without one another. You need good content with personal stories that would keep the audience hooked to what you're saying. That coupled with good delivery will make it hard for the audience to take their eyes off of you which will make listening to your speech an experience in itself.

7. How much do you prepare before a speech?

I prepare a lot. I work with my mentors, revise my speech several times, get my content finalized and start practicing my delivery. I practice it in front of the mirror, in front of my family, my friends, and my mentors and get their feedback on my speech. Even after doing all that I still get butterflies in my stomach before every speech I do.



8. What additional things did you gain as a Gavelier along with your incredible public speaking skills?

I would say leadership skills, how to work as a team, how to negotiate with people, how to make people believe and do what you say, how to hype up others, how to provide comfort when someone's down, being patient while mentoring kids, how to cheer at the top of your lungs, how to pose for pictures after winning competitions, how to stay calm and positive in the middle of chaos, how to overthink everything you do, how to make action plans and to do lists and how to stay awake well past midnight. I'd say basically all the essential life skills to survive in this competitive world.

9. As a public speaker you have participated in many competitions. Can you share some tips for preparing for a public speaking competition?

Start preparing well ahead of time. For if you stay until the last moment it's going to be really stressful. So first thing is to find a story or a message that you are passionate about sharing. You need to believe in what you're saying. Then once you've drafted the script revise it with the help of your mentors, get as many feedback as possible. But don't forget to set a deadline for feedback because you can't keep altering your speech forever. I usually stop taking feedback at least two days before the competition day. Practicing is key. Practice, practice and practice. On the day before the competition eat well and sleep early. On the day of the contest dress well as it can give you confidence and arrive at the venue early so you can check out the stage and your mics. Always believe in yourself and have confidence in your ability, because a little confidence can go a long way. Then as you stand on the stage to



deliver your speech always take a deep breath and smile, let it all sink in before you start speaking. And you'll see that miracles will happen.

10. Finally, what advice do you have for new aspiring speakers?

Don't give up. Because the journey of being a public speaker is definitely not a bed of roses. You're going to fail many times. You're going to be disappointed over and over again. There will be many setbacks and challenges for you to overcome. Even the simplest task of coming up with a story can feel hard sometimes. At those times remember don't ever give up. Keep trying, keep pushing your limits, challenge your comfort zones and just keep doing what you're doing. And one day you'll realize all the pain was worth it.



Speech Olympiad XIV, In Retrospect

summary of the previous Speech Olympiad

"Am I audible and visible enough?"

Right after a year, the Speech Olympiad Shield was ready to be engraved with a new champion's name. With the experience of an entirely virtual Speech Olympiad the previous year - 2020, the organising committee was fully prepared to put up a fight against the challenges caused by the pandemic. Unlike any other year, seventy-eight undergraduates at University Moratuwa, unmasked themselves and appeared in front of the web camera (which was not a "new normal" at that time, with speech contests being held virtually) in order to share their stories, and leave a legacy. The twelve semifinalists were extensively trained and the stage, the zoom meeting rather, was set for the semifinal. After a very intense battle, five talented contestants managed to get into the Grand Final.

The Grand Final, the utmost dare of the journey, was held in a hybrid manner. The five finalists were able to pause the breath of not only the audience but also the judges, for a while, with their unsurpassable speeches. After witnessing an extraordinary evening, the judgement of the audience, the Most Popular Speaker award, was won by Niruthikka Sritharan. The Best Prepared Speaker award and the Best Impromptu Speaker award were taken by Shehan Paul and Niruthikka Sritharan respectively.



The most impending moment, announcing winners of the event, was handled by the Speech Olympiad XIII champion, Jayoda Dissanayake. While Selani Indrapala picked up the Second Runner-Up mini shield, Shehan Paul picked the First Runner-Up mini shield. Finally, Niruthikka Sritharan conquered victory and was able to leave her legacy on the shield for decades.

Verity Price is not just a public speaker but an accomplished singer and actress as well. She is the first African and just the sixth woman to be crowned as the world champion of public speaking. Doing all of this while being an avid hiker and

fulfilling her countless responsibilities as a mother makes Verity's accomplishments all the more impressive.

The goal of Verity's session was to teach us the art of crafting a winning speech. She began by telling us the story of how she developed the right mindset for a world champion. Her first time participating in the world championship of public speaking was in 2012. She did not take the competition too seriously.

Verity wrote a story the day before the competition and entered with a carefree attitude. Despite her best efforts, even in subsequent years, she could never do better than placing 3rd in her Division. But in 2021, Verity Price trained 4 hours a day, every day, for 3 months.

She also spoke about crafting a winning speech. Verity summed up the entire speechwriting process in 4 steps represented by the letters G, I, F, and T. They are,

- 1. Get clear on your message
- 2. Intentionally craft your story
- 3. Fill in the gaps for your audience
- 4. Tie it all together

The final part of the programme was a Q&A session where the participants could clarify their concerns about public speaking. Participants as young as 14 years old directed questions on a broad array of topics from incorporating humour into a speech to dealing with a stutter. Verity patiently handled all of these questions, providing clear and insightful answers for the participants.

And thus, Dream Big 2022 came to a close. The third instalment in the Dream Big saga was concluded successfully, leaving all participants in eager anticipation for next year's edition with another world champion.




